The Museum must also thank Dorothy Bahret and the Rhinebeck Garden Club for their work in organizing volunteers to landscape and plant with flowers the area around the World War I Doughboy Statue on East Market Street--their efforts to enhance the attractiveness of that site calls

attention to the importance we place on properly honoring those who left Rhinebeck--many never to return--to serve their country. Most of all, thank you to the many members of the community who continue to donate their cherished treasures to us.

The Museum is preparing a new brochure that emphasizes the variety of items in the collections, as part of an effort to bring more visitors to the Museum. Our exhibit opens June 6th. We hope you will be able to join us.

County Historians Elect Steven Mann

Current trustee and former Museum recording secretary and president Steven Mann was elected president of the Dutchess County Historical Society at its annual meeting on Saturday, April 5, at the Starr Library in Rhinebeck. Town Historian Nancy V. Kelly, who with her husband Arthur received the Society's 2007 Helen Wilkinson Reynolds Award for their meticulous search for historical truth, was the keynote speaker, addressing the Palatines coming to the Rhinebeck area in the early 18th century.

Mann, a permanent resident of Rhinebeck since 2000 and a weekender six years prior, is a native of Catskill.

Welcome, Barbara Harrison and Eva McClenahan. The Museum Board recently filled vacancies created by the resignations of Lida Traver-Landy and Alex McKnight. Both Lida and Alex had contributed in very significant ways to the Museum, and Lida will be continuing to serve on the Museum's Advisory Board.

Both of the Museum's new board members are long-time residents of Rhinebeck. Barbara K. Harrison, born in Poughkeepsie, spent her elementary school years there, moved to Ohio during WWII, moved to Rhinebeck in 1950, and married Jack Harrison, a veteran of the fighting in the South Pacific. Barbara studied accounting at Krissler Business Institute, then kept the accounts for Russell Fuel and Heating for 25 years--oil was 16 cents a gallon when she started. She also handled accounts receivable for Ruge's Oldsmobile, and worked for Sherri Shaw at the Elegant Villager for 27 years. She is an ardent needlepointer, and annually serves as a judge at the Dutchess County Fair, and is a long-time parishioner of the Church of the Messiah.

Eva McClenahan is a native of Kingston, and like Barbara has been living in Rhinebeck since the 1950's. The family name is no doubt familiar to anyone in Rhinebeck who has ever worn glasses, since Eva's husband, Jim, was the village optometrist for 40 years. Eva is the parent of six, all graduates of Rhinebeck Central School, and "all doing well," she tells us, "thanks to a good school system and great school teachers." The McClenahan family traveled extensively throughout the USA

and many of the islands, visiting many historical sites. As a result, antiques and historical literature are two of her great interests. In her spare time she is a care giver and a volunteer member of the Braille Center at 3rd Lutheran Church. Eva is looking forward to working with the members of the board and being an asset.
