President's Message

Our deepest thanks to Museum members who joined the Board at the Red Hook Golf Club on a blustery November evening to honor Tom Daley for his significant contributions to local history. For many years, Tom has been travelling up and down the Hudson Valley, photographing its treasures. His sensitive eye and his feeling for beauty have resulted in what we believe one of the most comprehensive is photographic records of 20th century Hudson Valley art and architecture. The highlight of the evening for all of us was his announcement that he intends eventually to donate the collection to the Museum.

Plaudits to Cynthia Owen Philip for her recently published book, Rhinecliff, A Hudson River History—The Tangled Tale of *Rhinebeck's Waterfront*. It is exceptionally well-researched and has benefited from Cynthia's immersion in the life of the community she writes about. The same can also be said about Town Historian Nancy Kelly's just-released book, Rhinebeck's Historic Architecture, published by The History Press. On Saturday, April 4th, the Starr Library hosted a book-signing by Nancy, and \$10 from the sale of each book went towards supporting the local history room-generosity much appreciated by all of us who depend on the resources there.

Rhinecliff and Rhinebeck have lucked out by having in our midst not one but two individuals willing to devote the time and energy necessary to do the kind of digging required to uncover what matters and then to present it in a manner that ties the past to the present. As an organization devoted to the preservation and promotion of local history, the Museum is delighted to see what they have accomplished.

Our own Museum Board is undergoing a transition. I am delighted to report that Lida Traver-Landy, who had served previously as both Corresponding Secretary and President, is returning to us as a Trustee. We also have a vacancy on the Board which we expect to fill shortly.

And while we are thrilled with the great number of donated items, the Museum is feeling the pinch of inadequate space. Proper storage and cataloging of donated items are requiring us to reduce the amount of room at Quitman available for exhibits. While we will continue to exhibit each summer and fall in the remaining space at Quitman, we hope as well to display some of our collections at the Morton and Starr Libraries, and at other publicly accessible venues in Rhinebeck.

1. 4-drawer filing cabinet

Most questions about a document or photo can be answered by viewing a scanned image, which allows the original to remain in better condition.

Rhinebeck House and Garden Tour Saturday June 6 (Sunday 7th if rain)

The Museum of Rhinebeck History will join forces with the Chancellor Livingston Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution to host a house and garden tour on Saturday, June 6th (Sunday, June 7th in case of rain).

This year's tour will include three gardens in the Village of Rhinebeck—one on East Market Street and two on Chestnut Street, and three in the Town of Rhinebeck—one on Mt. Rutsen Road, one on Delano Drive, and a third off Cedar Heights Road.

This year's tour will also feature the extraordinary McKim, Mead and White carriage house, formerly part of the Schuyler estate. In the afternoon, Grasmere will also be open to our participants.

During the tour, two special events are planned. From 10-10:30, a free continental breakfast will be offered at the DAR Chapter House, 77 Livingston Street. The new colonial kitchen in the house, partially funded by an gift iin memory of the late Helen Hill Schoonmaker of Poughkeepsie, a Rhinebeck native, will be open for a tour. (Mrs. Schoonmaker was the grandniece of the late Helen Reed DeLaporte of Rhinebeck, founder of the Chancellor Livingston Chapter and a former State and National DAR officer.) From 12 - 3, tours will be given of the Dutch Reformed Church, located on Route 9 at South Street. And at the Cedar Heights location in the afternoon, Master Gardener Cecily Frazier will give a talk on summer bulbs. These activities are all part of the admission fee.

The first 75 people to walk through the DAR that morning will receive special gift bags. In addition, there will be a silent auction at

the DAR house for perennials, gift baskets, and other goods donated by DAR members, friends of the Museum, and local businesses. Tickets for the silent auction will be able to be purchased throughout the day at the DAR House.

Bag lunches will be available at the Dutch Reformed Church, by prior reservation, between 12:00 and 3:00.

Tickets are \$20 per person if prepaid before June 2, and \$25 per person the day of the tour. (There will be no refunds.) 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The Thorne Quaker deed from Crum Elbow Friends Meeting, a portion of which we see above, is signed Feb 17, 1752. It describes a transfer to Ebenezer Hu[e]ssted of 49 acres near what is now Frost Mills in Hyde Park, and is signed by Samuel Cornell, a member of the Thorne family, which family were elders of the Quaker congregation at Crum Elbow, southeast of Rhinebeck. Other signers include Martin Hoffman, Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, Jonathan Reynolds, and Daniel Harris.
