

Exciting and Enticing 2015 Exhibit on Rhinebeck Schools Planned

Exhibit Chair Steven Mann is already at work with President Elizabeth Clarke on the exhibit for this coming year. The "YE OLDE SCHOOL DAYS" Exhibit will feature photographs and limited memorabilia from the former district schools. There were 12 district schools including, in numeric from 1-12: Morton; Brick (Rhinecliff); Hook; Hillside; Village (Rhinebeck); Stone Church, Ackert Hook; Wurtemburg; Eighmeyville; White Schoolhouse (at corner of Slate Quarry); Miller; and Flat Rock.

Another part of the exhibit will feature some of the many private schools that were located in town over the years including DeGarmo, Crow Hill, Fox Hollow, Cardinal Farley, and Rhinebeck Country. "The information I have compiled over the past few years on the DeGarmo Institute is absolutely fascinating", said Mann, who noted, "some very influential Americans passed through Rhinebeck and were educated at the Institute when it was located on Livingston Street."



Fire at District 5 School

Besides photographs, a display focusing on the building of the "new" schools following the great 1939 fire at the Buckley School will be included. Photographs and quotes from oral history related to the fire will also be included. Late residents Barbara Vaughan Frost, Ralph Haskins, and Betty Decker will be among those whose remembrances will be included in the section on that fire. Old yearbooks, high school play programs, and high school graduation programs will be available for visitors to actually sit and read. A collection of children's class papers from the late Mandeville Frost, who was a school teacher in the late 19th century, will also be included. For the first time a group of early 20th century class photographs from the late Margaret Bowman of Rhinebeck, donated last year by her nephew and niece, James and Donna Closs, will be on display.

Fox Hollow's Connection to College Rowing History Elizabeth Clarke



Fox Hollow

Marist College has been doing research on the Poughkeepsie Regatta for some time now. I have recently joined the project and have been conducting extensive research on this event using local newspapers, including *The Rhinebeck Gazette*. The Regatta ran on the Hudson River from 1895 to 1949 with Cornell University, Columbia University, University of Pennsylvania, University of California Berkeley, Princeton University and more participating in this event. This race was an important part of Poughkeepsie's history, but it is not without connections to Rhinebeck. The crew

coaches often came up to Rhinebeck for dinner or to give a talk. Famously, the Navy coach, Buck Walsh, was injured while visiting Rhinebeck and was unable to go out on the water with his team during the race. Part of the research conducted by Marist College involves compiling all of the boathouse and crew quarters locations into a map. Very little was known about where the crews stayed until recently and during the course of this research, I discovered that the crew teams had stayed as far north as Rhinebeck. Fox Hollow, the home of Tracy Dows, had become a girls' boarding school in 1930 and in 1934, the University of California Berkeley elected to stay at the school. This was a fair distance from their boathouse at Poughkeepsie at what is now Longview Park. The teams took a bus down to Poughkeepsie from the main house at Fox Hollow. That year, California won the varsity race at Poughkeepsie and the school's principal, Aileen Farrell, took credit for the victory because the crew had enjoyed staying there so much. This will all be documented in Marist's online exhibition on the Poughkeepsie Regatta, which will feature photographs of Fox Hollow from the Museum's collection. The Marist exhibit will be re-launched with an in depth treatment of all crew locations and with a more local perspective on the event. The history of the Fox Hollow School will be a prominent part of our upcoming 2015 exhibit on Rhinebeck's schools so please visit the Museum to learn more about this fascinating institution.
